WAPAKONETA MAYOR TOM STINEBAUGH FOUND GUILTY OF THEFT IN OFFICE AND ETHICS LAW VIOLATIONS

Ohio Attorney General Dave Yost announced in a <u>press release</u> that on October 29, 2022, an Auglaize County Common Pleas Court jury found former Wapakoneta Mayor Tom Stinebaugh guilty of theft in office, a fifth-degree felony; having an unlawful interest in a public contract, a fourth-degree felony; and three counts of conflict of interest, each a first-degree misdemeanor.

Stinebaugh was sentenced to 18 months in prison; the sentence was stayed pending appeals.

The charges stemmed from Stinebaugh's participation in promoting his brother as fire chief and obtaining a sewer line extension to a property he was developing at city expense.

Stinebaugh's mayoral duties <u>were previously suspended</u> under Ohio Revised Code 3.16, which authorizes the suspension of a public official who has been charged with a felony in a state or federal court when the felony relates to the performance of the official's duty. Under R.C. 2921.41(C)(1), Stinebaugh's conviction of theft in office forever disqualifies him from holding any public office, employment, or position of trust in this state.

The case was investigated by BCI and the Ohio Ethics Commission.
